



he 021-22 represented another unbelievable one for the communities of the Nicola Valley. As the economical and personal affects of the pandemic are only now beginning to be understood, the Valley found itself rocked back-to-back by unprecedented events in their own right. Recordbreaking heat waves, a historical wildfire season and of course the November 2021 Coldwater river flooding resulted in homes lost, lives disrupted permanently and a year of challenges unlike any other.

Throughout this, I'm proud of the diligent work of our Staff and Board. We looked to this year to represent the end of challenges that have overshadowed the past few years, but it may have been the most challenging yet. Despite this, the Community Futures Nicola Valley team was able to play pivotal roles in the recovery of the city, from a B.C.E.D.A. partnership to close cooperation with the Red Cross Resiliency Centre, even when evacuated and faced with their own material losses, our team wore the CF badge well.

Hardship encourages development, and looking ahead to 2022-23, my confidence in our Board and Staff to serve this community is higher than ever. More residents are aware of Community Futures and the mission we represent than ever and our Valley is headed to a brighter future!

A MESSAGE FROM THE MANAGER


Our General Manager gives her review on the 2021-22 fiscal year.

In the early part of the year, we saw increased digital communication with our clientele during an established pandemic, and in the mid to later parts, we managed to keep our doors open and provide a supportive presence for the community during the summer fires and fall flooding, of which both Joe and Joanne experienced damage to their homes. Acknowledgements go to CF Staff, Joanne and Joe, though displaced, our team came together despite the challenges.

This year has not been easy, and I have a special thank you to those of you on the Board of Directors for supporting us with the navigation of the changing tide. With you, we have created a lasting legacy. I honour your willingness to provide input to the vision, your support and provide guidance. Thank you so much.

And, now for numbers. As many of you know, I am your numbers person—if the numbers check out, we breathe a sigh of relief. Lucky we've been breathing steadily for years!

Between April 1 2021- March 31 2022 we had:

- 7 community meetings run remotely during the Nov.21 aftermath to engage in recovery planning.
- 57 individual businesses connected under the BCEDA partnership established for disaster relief. A shout out to Meagan for taking this on and ensuring our clients were heard.
- 5 up-and-coming businesses filling a full roster under the "Fresh Finds" umbrella at our Farmer's Market,
- 10 Active Local Partners- Working together to Support our Community .

- 21 New Active Loans given out to Stimulate and Support and Grow . (Additional # show elsewhere in the Report)
- 4 New Volunteers will be joining the CFNV Board as Directors at the Annual General Meeting.

AND A MESSAGE FROM OUR TEAM

Community Futures Nicola Valley's Team looks back on a year unlike any other.

here were significant challenges to face at the start of the 2021-22 fiscal year for the CFNV office many members of staff found themselves re-orienting to new roles, and some roles were left unfilled, to be supported by a smaller staff. Throughout a difficult summer, the office stabilized and continued to serve the community, adding Joanne Street to the staff in late summer and preparing to hit the ground running to assist businesses affected by COVID-19 and the unprecedented wildfire season.

It took only a few months for the next big challenge to present itself in the form of the Coldwater river flooding – staff found themselves separated and isolated during the one-month citywide evacuation, but continued to work remotely as a team, contacting clients and offering assistance all while wondering what the impacts to their own property, homes, and lives might be.

Upon returning to the community, the CFNV team got started immediately on support measures, working closely with Red Cross and contacting Provincial assistance in the form of B.C.E.D.A. - during this time, the **Emergency Business Assistance** Program was developed and launched by Community Futures Nicola Valley - providing support, connections to resources and lending, the program has been a significant success, and continues into 2022-23.

More than this, the businesses and residents of the Nicola Valley had a greater need; the need for community connection. Roughly a month of evacuation for the entire City of Merritt in the midst of the pandemic led to a homesickness that is still being soothed.

CFNV, beyond their previously mentioned partnerships with Red Cross and B.C.E.D.A., served the community with opportunities to get together, reminisce, celebrate, and support each other by way of a Chamber of Commerce partnership to deliver a Shop Local program and regularly scheduled Street Markets, as well as a new network partnership with the City, Chamber, and WorkBC to deliver even more information and events to the community.

As of writing this message, Community Futures Nicola Valley is already underway on new projects, programs and ways to engage, as well as making fast progress on our goals and objectives for the 2022-23 year. We're eager for the challenges that await and feel more prepared than ever to serve the business community of the Valley.


Dwaine Algate

LOANS DISBURSED

Financial Lending remains a core service offered by Community Futures Nicola Valley, and the 2021-22 fiscal year represents the first year of the staff in their current roles - despite massive impacts to the local economy and beyond with the summer heat waves, massive wildfires, and the November flooding of the Coldwater, CFNV managed to disburse \$167,000 to local businesses and is on track for even further growth.




LEVERAGES

More than doubling an annual target of \$100,000 for 2021-22, Community Futures Nicola Valley represents \$236,000 in leverages within the community from it's developmental lending program alone. This represents a new high for post-COVID numbers and trends toward significant growth ahead!

In addition to these commercial leverages, CFNV has provided nearly 300 hours of direct, one to one business counselling and bookkeeping training. **JOB CREATION** & GROWTH

A massive point of growth for Community Futures is job creation and maintenance - in 2020-21, CFNV maintained 8.5 FTEs through their lending program, but in 2021-22 that number climbs to 29! This is represented by 10 part time positions and 24 full time positions.

TYPES OF **BUSINESS LOANS**

This graph typically breaks down business loans into three categories - expansion represents a business broadening it's horizons, start-up represents a brand new business and maintenance represents lending as support for an affected business.

Due to the affects of the Coldwater flooding, 9 out of the 11 loans disbursed by CFNV were for business maintenance, whereas only one each were for startup costs or expansion costs.


